Dear Parents and Carers,

Together we have completed the first month of the 2022–23 academic year – and what a month it has been! Pupils and staff in our schools have already achieved so much both within and outside the classroom against a national background that has seen us welcome a new monarch, a new Prime Minister and yet another new Education Secretary.

It has been wonderful to welcome the class of 22, including the youngest children in reception classes, the new Year 7s in our secondary schools, young people starting in sixth form, and many new staff and leaders. I have enjoyed getting out into the schools to meet some of these arrivals and am impressed both at how they have settled in and how they have been made

welcome. There is a strong spirit of optimism and commitment around and it is so heartening to see so many children and adults living out our trust values of Respect, Opportunity, Collaboration and Aspiration.

As always, I must thank parents and carers for the support and encouragement you provide. We are aware that economic pressures mean the coming months will be a time of anxiety for many families; please be assured that we will continue to work with you to ensure your children keep on receiving the best possible education and care. The Covid pandemic showed us how beneficial it was to be a family of schools, supporting one another through difficulties, and we intend to take the lessons learned from the last few years and use them to tackle whatever challenges we face.

As well as being a help in troubled times, being part of Futura Learning Partnership gives schools a chance to maximise the joy. As a trust, we are able to offer opportunities over and above that which an individual school could provide. A fantastic example of this collaborative spirit came on September 13 when 400 children aged seven to 18 from ten of our settings took to the stage at Bath Forum to perform the Futura Oratorio. We had commissioned musician Phil Dixon to compose this piece, which featured two choirs and an orchestra, and the result - after a year of hard work - was beyond our wildest dreams. I am so grateful to our director of music Ingrid McLean and the 40 staff who helped put on this event, and, of course, to the parents, carers, grandparents and friends who came along on the night. It was an event that will live long in the memory.

We recognise the value of extra-curricular activities for our children. It is lovely to see sporting events, Duke of Edinburgh expeditions and class trips in full swing already this term after the restrictions of the past few years. But we have an equally firm focus on learning and are delighted to report some excellent results from last year's students as well as strong signs that next summer's test and exam candidates are set for success. An impressive 72 per cent of 2022 Futura students achieved five GCSE equivalents including a pass in both English and maths, while at A level well over half of all grades were A\*- B. Our students are being given the best possible chance to achieve thanks to the shared work on our Futura Curriculum, and we look forward to developing this further. It is a delight to see young people leaving our schools so well equipped for the next step on the road to realising their ambitions and dreams.

This is an exciting year for our trust, as we welcome new members of our family of schools, and explore opportunities to grow further. We welcome 3-2-4 Playgroup in Keynsham and Bridge Farm Primary School in Whitchurch, who joined us over the summer, and look forward to the arrival of Four Acres Primary later this year. We are working closely with the Clevedon Learning Trust, which comprises 11 primary and two secondary schools, as we look towards the proposed merger. Our proposals have been submitted to the Department for Education and we hope for approval from the South West Advisory Board imminently. The values of our two trusts are closely aligned and it is clear that bigger trusts provide resilience, saving time and money that can be reinvested in our schools, so we are very keen to go ahead and join forces.

September 2022 will always be remembered as the month when Queen Elizabeth II died, bringing to an end an incredible 70 years on the throne. The period of national mourning gave us all a chance to reflect, thinking about the personal as well as the national and international aspects of the Royal Family's loss. It was also an opportunity within our schools for us to help children understand more about the values that underpin our society. Her Late Majesty continued her life of duty and service to the end. In our trust, we are also committed to serving our communities and we are thankful that so many individuals, including our volunteer governors and trustees, as well as our staff and students, share that dedication.

So, onwards to October, which we can face with optimism! Once again, thanks to you all for supporting your children in and out of school. Your young people deserve the best and we will work in partnership with you to make sure they get it.

### OFSTED RATES THE MEADOWS PRIMARY AS GOOD IN ALL AREAS

The Meadows in Bitton is a happy and successful school – and that's official!

Ofsted inspectors have rated the village primary as Good in all areas of educational provision.

The long-awaited judgement has been welcomed by our trust, which took over the running of The Meadows after the school was placed in special measures in 2016.

Chief executive Andrea Arlidge said: "The Ofsted visit confirmed what families, staff and governors have known for some years – The Meadows is a lovely school where children are nurtured, relationships are strong and expectations for behaviour and learning are high.

"Congratulations to headteacher Joy Mounter and her team for creating the school this community deserves and continuing to strive for further success."

Two inspectors visited the 156-pupil school for two days in May and judged it to be Good for quality of education, behaviour and attitudes, personal development, leadership and management and early years provision.

They reported: "Leaders have created a happy and united school community. There is a strong sense of teamwork and cooperation throughout the school."

Other positive comments in the report included:

- Leaders have high expectations of pupils' work, attitudes and behaviour.
   Staff give pupils the help they need to succeed. Pupils work hard and are keen to do their best.
- Pupils are happy and safe because everyone behaves well. Staff help them understand how to behave and to treat each other with respect.
- Lessons are calm, positive and purposeful.
- Pupils are well prepared socially and academically for secondary school.

The inspectors highlighted the priority given to reading and said that rich language and high-quality texts formed the basis of an engaging and ambitious curriculum. Maths was said to be skilfully taught.

The report noted that leaders

worked hard to ensure pupils learn about race, culture and beliefs that are different from their own.

The inspectors also praised the wide range of experiences and personal development opportunities for children, including after-school clubs, visits and visitors.

Mrs Mounter said: "We are proud and pleased that Ofsted has recognised the qualities of our school: we know our families so well and we have created a culture of respect and positive behaviour that supports children in their learning and personal development.

"We are already working on the next steps suggested by the inspectors – completing the review of our academic and personal development provision – to ensure that children continue to thrive and learn even more successfully.

"My thanks go to our children, staff, families, governors, and Futura Learning Partnership for their support.

"Working together collaboratively and effectively benefits our whole school community."

### MARVELLOUS MUSICIANS DELIVER MEMORABLE MOMENTS

Our first trust-wide music event, The Futura Oratorio, took place on Tuesday 13th September at Bath Forum, Four hundred pupils aged seven to 18 from ten schools took part, forming two primary choirs, a senior choir and an orchestra. We enjoyed

an afternoon of rehearsals with our composer and conductor, Phil Dixon, followed by a performance. It was a fabulous event and for many of our students the first time they had sung with a live orchestra. The orchestra was made up of students from across the trust. We nearly filled the venue and received a standing ovation at the end.

The 30-minute musical piece was entitled *Avona* and was based on the myth of how the river Avon came into being. Work on it began last year when Phil Dixon visited all our Year 10 Music classes at Bedminster Down, Sir Bernard Lovell and Wellsway and came up with initial compositional ideas. He then went away and arranged the melodies and chord progressions into the Oratorio.

Our thanks to Bath Forum for providing such a special space for our performance. Thanks also to 40 incredible staff, from teachers to TAs and support staff who supported this event - we could not have done this without their enthusiasm. It was an ambitious project but it is so important to us to ensure that our students have the opportunity for quality music-making; working collaboratively enables us to achieve this. Already staff and students have been suggesting doing more activities like this ... watch this space!

### LET'S MAKE TRAVEL TO SCHOOL SAFER FOR EVERYONE

**SIX** children are killed or seriously injured on UK roads every day. This sobering statistic is one reason why we at Futura Learning Partnership are signing up to the annual Road Safety Week, which this year takes place from November 14-20.

But it's not the only driving force (pardon the pun!). We are firmly in support of the 2022 theme chosen by the Brake charity: Safer Roads for All.

Everyone has the right to make safe and healthy journeys and we all need to play our part in enabling this to happen. While most road users do take care and are courteous to others, a minority do not. Anyone who lives near a school (any school, even one of ours) will have seen examples of thoughtless and sometimes downright dangerous driving and parking. We're taking part in...



Wansdyke School has been a pioneer of Bristol's School Streets programme, which bans cars at drop-off and pick-up times. Most of our schools encourage parents who have to bring children to school by car to park a distance away and walk the final stretch - and urge anyone who is able to walk, cycle or scoot the whole journey. Ironically, some families try these greener modes of travel then say they are forced to abandon them because of the perils they encounter en route.

There are, of course, environmental aspects too - air quality around schools can be severely reduced when too many of us take to our cars.

The Road Safety Week 2022 campaign will raise awareness of issues including safe vehicles and speeds, the recent update to the Highway Code and the new hierarchy of road users, and the importance of inclusivity to keep us all safe on the roads, no matter who we are or how we travel.


